Philmont Trivia

The following comes from "Philmont: Where Spirits Soar" published by the Boy Scouts of America in 1989 in cooperation with Phillips Petroleum as part of the 50th anniversary of Waite Phillips' gift and the anniversary of the first participants to visit Philmont Scout Ranch. As such, many of the numbers have increased drastically since Philmont's 50th anniversary.

- ◆ *Philmont is the largest organized camping area in the world.*
- ◆ *It's believed only the U.S. Army uses more trail food than Philmont.*
- ◆ *The first scouts went through Philmont in the summer of 1939.*
- ◆ *526,000 Scouts have gone through Philmont in 50 years.*
- ◆ *A record 19,293 Scouts went through Philmont in 1968.*
- ◆ *Some 14,572 Scouts went through Philmont in 1989.*
- ◆ *The average Scout carries a 35-pound pack and hikes 75 miles in 12 days.*
- ◆ *14,572 Scouts at Philmont hiked a total of 1,050,000 miles in 1989 carrying a total of 42,000 pounds of gear on their backs. This is equal to 42 trips around the world.*
- ◆ *Total number of miles hiked by all Scouts who have gone through Philmont in its (first) 50-year history: 38,400,000. This is equal to 160 trips to the moon.*
- ◆ *In 1989, Scouts contributed 42,000 hours to conservation.*
- ◆ *Philmont comprises 214 square miles or 137,493 acres.*



HOMe is just one name for Philmont by those that who have experienced its majestic beauty, hiked its rugged mountains, crossed its cool mountain streams and have wonderful memories of a land in northern New Mexico.

When these lucky Scouts and Scouters return to Philmont they feel a warmth growing inside them as they see the turnoff sign for Philmont in downtown Cimarron which continues to grow as they see the Arrowhead rock formation on the backside of Tooth Ridge with the buffalo heard in the foreground , on past the Villa Philmonte and finally to the entrance sign with a view of the front side of the Tooth of Time. By the time they step off the bus or out of their vehicle they come to feel that they are finally home.

Many of the returning staff feel this way and choose careers that keep their summers open or decided that just one college degree is just not enough. They feel this uncontrollable desire to return HOMe for another summer and see those fellow staff members that are like family.

But HOMe does not just stand for being around family and friends, but

is an acronym that stands for "H" (Heaven) "O" (On) "m" "E"(Earth). The Philmont hymn refers to Philmont as "Scouting's Paradise" and "God's Country." Philmont is truly a magical place that holds that heart of many that have walked her trails.

Although over 20,000 scouts have the chance to participate in the program each summer at Philmont, many others do not get the chance. Reservations for backpacking treks are typically taken two years in advance and fill up very quickly. Backpacking treks however, are not the only way to get to Philmont.

The Cavalcade Trek, Rayado Trek, ROCS, Ranch Hands and OA Trail Crew Programs are some of the less known programs offered at Philmont Scout Ranch. Cavalcade Trek programs are for units like the backpacking treks, however the Rayado Treks, ROCS, Ranch Hands and OA Trail Crew are individual programs for individual Scouts that come from all over and form their crews once they arrive at Philmont.

A **Cavalcade Trek** is one that the participants go camp to camp on horseback. Participants spend time learning how to care for and getting acquainted with the horses. Partici-

pants then take to the trail with two of Philmont's finest ranch hands, going from camp to camp, participating in programs like the backpacking trek participants. Cavalcade Treks typically do not fill up as quickly, since the program is not as widely known about. It is a great opportunity for those units that missed out on a backpacking trek.

Older individual Scouts more experienced with backpacking have the opportunity to participate in a **Rayado Trek**. This program stresses self reliance while developing team work. Participants have a difficult and long hike ahead of them, but also have memories that will last a lifetime.

Ranch Hands, ROCS (Roving Outdoor Conservation School) and **OA Trail Crew** are all similar programs where individuals work for the first half of their time on service to Philmont and spend the second half of their time on a trek. Ranch Hands works with the horse department

and then participates in a Cavalcade. ROCS participants spend their time with the conservation department in Philmont's backcountry learning about the environment and conservation projects.

OA Trail Crew has been discussed in the newsletter before and has been included as part of the Jumpstart indoctrination program for new members. It is a wonderful program only open to Order of the Arrow members. The Arrowmen spend the first week building trails and perform other conservation projects and then spend their last half hiking Philmont's trails and participating in the programs.

All of Philmont's programs are a wonderful opportunity if one ever has a chance to participate, however OA Trail Crew is very special opportunity. "You need seek no rocky summit: These high places are within you," but that does not mean you might not want to.

- ◆ *The value of Philmont (in 1989) is \$54 million.*
- ◆ *The shortest itinerary trek is 50 miles.*
- ◆ *At Philmont, ground squirrels are called "minibears" and fruit drink is called "bug juice."*
- ◆ *More than 700,000 meals are served in three months of operation.*
- ◆ *The average Scout loses between one to three gallons of fluid a day hiking the trails at Philmont.*
- ◆ *In 1988, Scouts Consumed:*
 - 190,500 cups of cocoa*
 - 119,300 beef jerky strips*
 - 93,000 beef sticks*
 - 84,000 cans of peaches*
 - 80,000 boxes of crackers*
 - 43,072 cans of "spreadables"*
 - 42,192 tubes of squeeze cheese*
 - 112,848 cans of pop*
 - 800 pounds of popcorn*
 - 80,000 ice cream cones*
- ◆ *Scouts mailed 81,589 postcards in 1988 and bought 14,385 t-shirts.*
- ◆ *Philmont employs over 600 (currently over 900) seasonal staff members each summer.*
- ◆ *Philmont has 1,972 tents, 684 backpacks, and 1,035 bear bags.*
- ◆ *The elevation at Philmont ranges from 6,500 feet to 12,441 feet.*
- ◆ *On any given day at Base Camp during the summer season, there are 600 scouts—300 arriving; 300 leaving.*
